


ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Lord House is a 2½-story house built in the late 19th century that displays many Greek Revival characteristics including gable front orientation to the street, a recessed sidehall entry, gable-end returns, and pedimented window caps. The sidehall entry has double-leaf (Victorian) doors and simple pilasters rising to a partial entablature. All of the windows have two-over-one sash and are framed by shutters. The medium-pitch roof is topped by a narrow chimney with a corbelled cap and the roofline has a boxed cornice with a wide frieze. The main block rests on a brick foundation.

A 1½-story gable-roofed ell extends to the east. It rests on a brick foundation and has an attached 1-story garage to the east. To the south of the main block is a 1-story, shed-roofed wing.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

This house may have been built on the site of an earlier structure. It is certainly one of the grander sidehall entry Greek Revival houses in town, due perhaps in part to having been built a bit later in the 19th century. The Victorian detailing contributes to its sense of importance, viewed with the houses on either side. The north end of the Plains seems more imposing than other sections.
