

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Shalett house is a 1½-story Mansard style structure of the late 19th century. The center entry has double-leaf doors, each with two panels and one large light. All of the windows are two-over-two and some have projecting caps. To the right of the entrance is a 1-story, flat-roofed bay window. Nine flat-roofed dormers have been set into the Mansard roof. The main block rests on a brick foundation. To the south is a 1-story, open porch with a hip-roof supported by one tapered square column.

A 1½-story gambrel-roofed ell extends to the east. It has five dormers set into its roof. These dormers are identical to those on the main block. The ell rests on a brick foundation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The J. Goodrich House is one of a pair of Mansard houses on the east side of Main St., the Patten House, Site #48, is the other. These two houses are clearly related as their style is remarkably alike. Both structures appear clearly on the 1856 map, a date which would seem early for this style to appear in Kingston. They may have been remodeled by the same person. Further investigation is necessary to support this theory. As a pair, they are extremely important to the district as the only examples of this style. Both are in need of proper paint colors to complement their architecture.
