



ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Woodworth House is a 2-story, 5-bay, Greek Revival style structure with some Victorian era remodeling. The center entry has a 6-panelled (Victorian era) door with one large light surmounted by a pedimented transom. All of the windows have two-over-two sash and projecting caps. The low-pitched roof is topped by a narrow, corbel-capped chimney and the eaves treatment consists of a boxed cornice with gable-end returns. The house is framed by narrow pilasters and rests on a granite slab foundation.

The 1½-story, gable-roofed ell has clapboard siding, two-over-two windows, a 6-panelled door, and rests on a granite slab foundation. On the north elevation of the main block is a 1-story shed which connects to the barn.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: To the northeast of the main block is a 1½-story, gable-roofed barn with an attached 1-story shed on its north elevation. A separate 1-story shed is located to the north of the barn.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 2.6 acres bounded to the N-Nason, S-Loick, E-Swatt, W-Ball Road.

The J. Winslow House is another example of the 5x2 bay, 2½ story house plan modified by Greek Revival details; i.e., the pediment over the central entry.
