


ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Frederick House is a 2½-story, twin chimney, Federal style structure. The 6-panel center entry door is surmounted by transom lights, and sheltered by a 1-story, hip-roofed open porch supported by square columns. Windows are nine-over-six and two-over-one, with architrave trim and shutters. The low-pitched roof is topped by twin, tall, narrow, corbel-capped chimneys, and the cornice treatment consists of close raking eaves and boxed, molded lateral eaves. The wall covering on the main block is graduated, feathered clapboard.

A 1-story gable-roofed ell rests on a cement foundation. It has a (new) 9-light door, six-over-six windows with shutters, and clapboard siding.

A small, 1-story, shed-roofed ell with clapboard siding rests on a cement foundation.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: An attached 1½-story shed/garage rests on a cement and brick foundation. It has clapboard siding, vertical-board doors, and assorted fixed-light windows.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 1.4 acres bounded to the N-Route 111, Martin, S-Pizar, E-Carlton, Martin, W-Route 111.
