

Restoring Habitat, One Yard at a Time

March 2024

Hello Everyone,

We're at that time of year when the sky is blue and beautiful! The sun is bright. It may be beautiful, but when you go outside and it's still 31 degrees!



The temperatures are very 'winter' right now. I think everyone is yearning for spring, but we need to wait until it is 'real' spring.

A few thoughts on getting ready for warm weather:

If the past few years are a guide, we will have warm weather (60s +) for a few days. We'll want to get out a rake and DO something! Unfortunately it's only false spring, and the temps will drop and we'll have more frosts...yet again.

We need to be good neighbors to all the little creatures that are sleeping through the winter. There are catapillers under the leaves and mulch. There are native bees nesting in the woody flower stalks. One of the many facinating facts about pollinators is that some caterpillers freeze solid, then defrost in the spring. (Nature is amazing) But we must wait until we have temperatures in the 70s for at least 5 to 10 days.

Also, this is still prime time to plant native seeds. Go outside and scuff the seeds into the snow in a spot of your choosing. Most native seeds have a tough, impervious covering, and they need the freeze and thaw cycle to soften and germinate, a process called scarification. So plant your seeds directly outside or in pots out of doors.

If your town has a seed library and you are able to pick up in Kingston, we can supply you with many types of seed. A friend recently introduced us as the "Johnny Appleseed" of pollinator plant seeds in NH. All year, native pollinator plant seed is available at the Seed Library at the Kingston Community Library, free

for the taking whether you live here in town or not. We also have vegetable seeds to choose from.

Look for the big Seed Library re-opening event

in March or April.


