## ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Faucher House is a 2-story, 5x2 bay, Federal style structure. The center entry has a 6-panelled door flanked by half-length sidelights and topped by a transom light. Flanking the sidelights are pilasters which rise to a full entablature. All of the windows are nine-over-six framed by shutters and architrave trim. The low-pitch gableroof is topped by a narrow, corbel-capped chimney and the roofline has a boxed cornice with a molded frieze and gable-end returns (later additions date unknown). The house rest on a granite slab foundation above which is narrow water table.

A 2-story, gable-roofed ell projects to the east. Half of its foundation is brick and the rest granite slabs. It is topped by a narrow, corbel-capped chimney. A 1-story, hip-roofed, enclosed porch projects from its south elevation. A second ell projects to the east of the main block. It has a shed-roof and rest on a concrete block foundation.

**RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:** A separate 1%-story, gable-roofed barn is located to the southeast of the main block. It has clapboard siding and a cement foundation.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 1.2 acres bounded to the N-E. Clark, S-M. Clarke, E-Clark, W-Main Street.
