

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Clark House is a 2-story, hip-roofed, twin chimney, Federal style structure. The center entry has a 5-panelled door with one large and is topped by a panelled transom. Flanking the door are pilasters which rise to a full entablature. Most of the windows are twelve-over-twelve or twelve-over-eight framed by architrave trim. The hip-roof is topped by twin, narrow chimneys and the eaves treatment consists of a boxed cornice with a narrow, molded frieze. The house rests on a granite block foundation topped by a narrow watertable.

The 2-story, gable-roofed ell has clapboard siding and rests on a brick foundation. The 1-story, flat-roofed ell has clapboard siding and rests on a cement foundation.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: A separate 2-story, gable-roofed barn with clapboard siding and a fieldstone foundation is located to the southeast of the main block. It has an attached shed-roofed shed.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: .6 acres bounded to the N-Bralen, S-Faucher, E-Clark, W-Main Street.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

A fine example of one of the few hip-roofed Federal houses surviving in Kingston. The detailing is more intricate than on other houses, giving a good indication of the high aspiration of its builders. This house is a major contributor to the architectural mix of the Historic District.

The first telephone exchange in Kingston was in the kitchen of this house.
