

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Daley house is a 2½-story Federal style structure. The central entry has a multi-panelled door with one large light, and is sheltered by a nedimented gable-roofed porch. Windows are all two-over-two with architrave trim. The medium-pitched roof is topped by two end-placed chimneys with corbeled caps. The cornice treatment consists of close raking eaves and a three-part molding on the lateral eaves.

A 2-story ell has the same windows and cornice treatment as the main block, and connects to a 2-story gable-roofed shed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Daley House is a typical example of vernacular architecture during the first part of the 19th century. It is in good condition and makes an important contribution to the streetscape of the Historic District.

Historic Associations: Land given by Jacob Hook Sanborn to Congregational Church to be used for first church-owned parsonage; according to Rodney Wilson's church history, the house was sold in 1915. James Daley, a later owner, had a barber shop and ice cream parlor here. Purchased by Town of Kingston from Grace Daley (daugher of James) in Nov. 1972, for \$17,000
