ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION: The Bartlett house is an unusual 2_{12} story, stick style structure with gable-front orientation to the road. Notable for its symetry, it is balanced by two side entrys, whose porches extend to repeat the slope of the roof, creating a layered effect. The symetry is also accentuated by the fenestration which features two pairs of 1/1 windows on the first and second stories. The first story windows are sheltered by shedlike window hoods supported by truss brackets. The structure and wooden fabric of the house have been emphasized by surface boards applied over the clapboards in a sill course, belt course, corner boards, and in particular the facia at the eaves on both main block and porch. The symetry is broken by two offset gables on the northwest and soutneast elevations. They have been treated with the same eaves as the main block. There is a shed-roofed dormer on the east. A 1-story, gable-roofed ell has clapboard siding, a victorian era door, two-over-two windows, and rests on a brick foundation. A 1-story, shed-roofed wing projects to the northwest.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: On each side of the house is a separate 1-story garage. A 1-story shed is located to the northeast of the house.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 3.4 Acres. Bounded to the N. and E. by Bartlett, S. by Roberts, Martin, W. by Town of Kingston, Depot Road.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The H. Towle House is the finest residential example of Stick Style architecture in Kingston. (The Kingston Church on the Plains is a noteworthy ecclesiastical example, and the Watson Academy in Epping is a similarly inspired academic example). The architecture would be better displayed by painting the clapboard wall surface and flat stick trim in contrasting colors.

Historic Associations: Owned c. 1910 by Dr. Sweeney; Dr. Zuck, the dentist, owned the house in the 1960's.
