

## ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Evans house is a 11/2-story Mansard style house of the late 19th century. The center entry has a four-panelled door with four lights flanked by paneled pilasters rising to a full entablature. On each side of the entrance is a 1-story, flat-roofed bay window. (The main entry and bay windows now constitute enclosed porch.) Above the entry is a large gable-roofed wall dormer with projecting, springing eaves and gableend returns. Eight gable-roofed dormers with bracketed surrounds have been set into the Mansard roof. The lower roofline has projecting eaves with brackets and ornamental drop pendants. All of the windows are two-over-two with projecting caps and decoratively cut surrounds. The structure rests on a brick foundation.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: There is a separate 1-story, gable-roofed garage located to the southeast.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The Patten House is one of a pair of Mansard Houses on the east side of Main Street and one of only three of this style in the entire town. The 1856 and 1892 maps show this property belonging to Rev. W. A. Patten. 1856 is a very early date for the Mansard Style to have been built in Kingston -- therfore the house may have been remodeled to this style by Rev. Patten at a later date. Its relationship to its neighbor, Site #47, is clear though the reason is unknown as of this writing.

Historic Associations: The Rev. Patten, who never preached in Kingston, owned the house for many years and remodeled it from its previous unknown style into a mansard. He lived here until his death in 1906, when he willed it to the Congregational Church. It was used as the parsonage until 1949 when it was sold for \$5,000.
