ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Morse House is a fine example of a 2-story, twin-chimney, Federal style structure. The center entry consists of a door with six recessed panels, a transom lights and is flacked by sidelights extending halfway to floor level and pilasters rising to full entablature. Windows are two-over-two with architrave trim and shutters except on the rear elevation which has nine-over-six windows. The low-pitched hip roof is surmounted by two chimneys with corbelled caps, and meets a boxed cornice at the eaves.

There is a (new) 1-story, shed-roofed porch on the southeast corner that shelters a door to the 1%-story ell. This (new) ell has fixed multi-light windows and a shed dormer on both the north and south sides. It connects to a 1-story, gable-roofed, five-bay ell with clapboard siding.

This ell, in turn, connects to a 21/2-story, gable-roofed barn that has double-leaf, vertical-board swinging doors, feathered clapboard siding, and rests on a fieldstone foundation.
