ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Gibson House is a late Greek Revival style structure which was later modified by the raising of the roof. The recessed sidehall entry has a wooden door with one roadpanel, and is flanked by sidelights extending its full height and paneled pilasters rising to a full entablature. Windows are two-over-one with chutters and the windows in the gable-end facade have segmentally arched window caps. The steeply pitched roof is surmounted by two chimneys with corbeled caps, and the eaves treatment consists of a boxed cornice with a wide frieze and gable-end returns supported by corner pilasters.

The 1%-story ell has a more steeply pitched roof topped by a tall chimney with a corbeled cap, close raking and lateral eaves, and clanboard wall covering. It rests on a granite block foundation, and has a four-panel door with transom lights on the south elevation. It connects to a 1-story, gable-roofed ell which rests on a cement block, brick, and fieldstone foundation.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: A gable-roofed 2%-story barn has a horizontally sliding vertical-board door, nine-over-six windows, and clapboard siding. It has close raking & lateral eaves, and rests on a fieldstone foundation.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: .5 acres bounded to the N-Dutton, S-Reynolds, E-Main Street, W-Reynolds, Moorse.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

The A. Brown House is an unusual example of the Greek Revival Style executed in kneewall construction. Its uniqueness derives from the juxtaposition of its small size against the bigness and number of its details -- it manages to cram 5 full-sized windows and a fully scaled recessed entry on its tiny facade.

Historic Associations: The Gibsons, the present owners, came to the house in the 1920s. She was librarian and postmistress.
