

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Masonic Building displays the massing and scale characteristics of Colonial Revival architecture. The 2 story 3X3 bay structure is topped by a truncated hip roof (originally surmounted by a balustrade) a feature which contributes to the buildings sense of monumentality.

Dominating the central bay of the facade is a 2 story gabled pavillion set off by Ionic rilasters. On the first story, the pavillion enframes the recessed main entry which is topped by a projecting pediment (originally supported on clustered Ionic columns; only portions of the capitals survive.) The pavillion's second story features four adjoining windows contained within a single rectangular surround, (the windows have been infilled), the side bays are distinguished by large 2/2 sash windows topped by wide architraves with cap moldings, and connected between the stories by vertical spandrel panels. The facade is further embellished by a wide architrave band below the roofline; this feature encircles the building. (corner pilasters originally ornamenting each corner have been removed.) The side elevations are characterized only by the symmetrical placement of the 2/2 windows.

The building rests on a brick foundation which contains a cornerstone bearing the buildings 1893 date.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

This was an outstanding example of the Georgian Revival style as attested by old photos which document the site. It could be easily restored to its former elegance.

Historic Associations: Owned by Kingston Masonic Building Association, Inc., prior to 1947. Cornerstone was laid on May 5, 1893, and dedicated on November 16, 1893.
