

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Moore house is a 1%-story, Greek Revival style structure. The sidehall entry has a four-panel door flanked by full length sidelights and pilasters rising to a full entablature. A side entry on the south elevation also has a four-panelled door with sidelights and is sheltered by a 1-story, shed-roofed open porch supported by turned posts and lined with balustrade. This entry leads into a 1-story, shed-roofed wing. All windows are two-over-one except in the (south) gable-roofed wall dormer, which has a two-over-two window. All the windows have vertical-board shutters and small caps. The medium-pitched roof meets a boxed cornice with gable-end returns supported by pilasters. The gable-end (east) facade contains a semi-circular louvered vent at the attic level.

A 1-story, gable-roofed ell has clapboard siding and close eaves and rests on a granite block foundation. Attached to this is a 1-story, shed-roofed ell resting on a poured concrete foundation.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: An attached, 2-story, gable-roofed barn has clapboard siding, a boxed cornice with gable-end returns, and six-over-six and nine-over-six window sash. The barn rests on a fieldstone foundation.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 2.08 acres bounded to the N-Sanborn, E-W. Main Street, S-Ernie, Coan, W-Wilson.
