

## ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Locke House is a 2-story, twin chimney Federal style structure. The multipanelled center entry door contains one large light. Pilasters flank the door and rise to meet a partial entablature. All windows are two-over-two and have architrave trim. The low-pitched roof is topped by two end-placed chimneys, and the cornice treatment consists of slightly projecting, molded eaves.

A 1½-story gable-roofed ell rests on a fieldstone and cement foundation, and is topped by one chimney. It has the same windows, siding, and eaves treatment as the main block.

A 1-story hip-roofed enclosed porch on the south side rests on a cement foundation. It has clapboard siding and a horizontally sliding vertical-board door.

A small 1-story shed-roofed ell is located to the north of the other ell and to the west of the main block.

The Silloway House is sited as an important visual anchor between Page Road and Danville Road. An unusual configuration for this region, it is possible that the roof was raised at some time to allow for the smaller windows in the 2nd story.
