

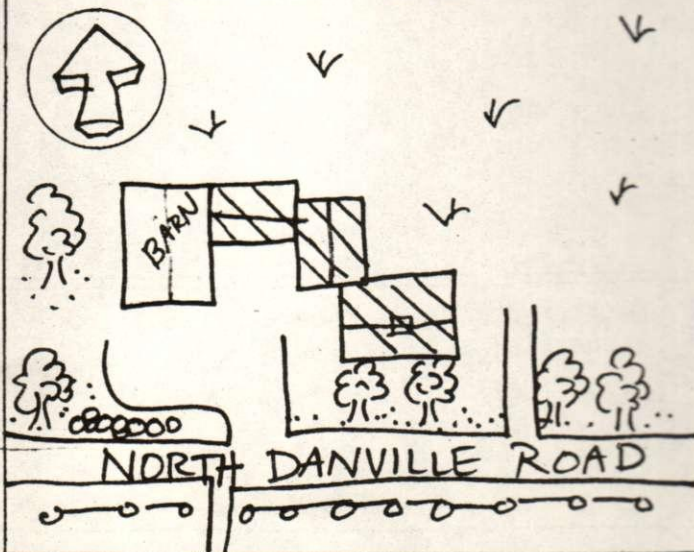

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Emerson house is a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ story, 5X2 bay, central chimney, Georgian style house. The center entry has a 4 panelled door framed by full length sidelights. Flanking the door are pilasters which rise to a full entablature. Most of the windows have slightly projecting caps and six over six, nine over six, or twelve over eight sash. The medium pitch roof is topped by a massive central chimney and the eaves treatment consists of a boxed cornice along the lateral eaves and close raking eaves with slight gable end returns. The house rests on a granite slab foundation.

The 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ story, gable roofed ell has clapboard siding, a 3 panelled door with four lights, and nine over six windows. Its steeply pitched roof is topped by a narrow chimney and the ell rests on a brick and stone foundation. Projecting from the west elevation of the ell is a 2 story, flat roofed wing.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: Attached to the west elevation of the wing is a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ story gable roofed barn with clapboard siding, nine over six windows, vertical board doors, and a stone foundation.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: 37 Acres. Bounded to the N. by Tucker, S. by North Danville Road, Perkins, and Killam, E. by Perkins, Killam and Killam, W. by Hogue and Tucker.
