

The Parkins House is a 1%-story late nineteenth century vernacular structure. The multi-light center entry door is sheltered by a 1-story, flat-roofed, screened porch. Windows have six-over-six sash, and some are flanked by shutters. The medium-pitched roof is topped by a tall, narrow, corbel-capped chimney, and the cornice treatment consist of close, molded, lateral and raking eaves.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT: A separate 1-story, shed-roofed to the west of the house has novelty siding.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION: .6 acres bounded to the N-Marshall Road, S-Gifford, E-Gifford, Borthwick, W-Gifford.
